

Cultivating Student Success at UCR: Pedagogical Ideas, Data, and Resources to Consider

This brief communication to faculty is developed by VPDUE Rodriguez and the Division of Undergraduate Education staff. The goal is to share pedagogical ideas, relevant UCR data, and resources to consider helping boost UCR student success. We will share this communication 2-3 times quarterly. PEDAGOGY

Below are some recommendations for teaching first generation college students to promote student success (Galina, 2016).

- Transparency the academic rules of college may be unfamiliar to first gen students. Be transparent as possible about your expectations for classroom engagement and assignments.
- Encourage study groups, especially in lowerdivision courses.
- Use rubrics to explicitly state the criteria that you will use to evaluate assignments.
- Model discussion discussion sections can be new to first gen students, therefore instructors should model effective dialogue.
- Given the invisibility that a first gen identity can bring, incorporating first gen into the curriculum can validate students. For example, select authors who are first gen or share about your own first gen experiences, if applicable.
- Develop personal relationships.
- While students bring many forms of community cultural wealth into the classroom (Yosso, 2005), professors can help their students build capital. For instance, encourage students to seek co-curricular activities to build social capital.

DATA

In Fall 2024, UCR enrolled 22,599 undergraduate students. Among them, 49.1% identified as first-generation students, meaning their parents or guardians did not complete a four-year college degree or higher within the United States.
